Limitation Of Liability Case Index

Get It Free

The Geoprofessional Business Association (GBA) has published a new edition of Limitation-of-Liability Case Index, an important legal reference conveying in lay terms the results of 75 cases where the legality of limitation-of-liability provisions has been challenged in the courts, usually without success. Available free of charge, the GBA document is particularly useful for geotechnical and other civil engineers, architects, other design professionals, environmental scientists, construction-materials engineering and testing (CoMET) professionals, and others who include a limitation-of-liability provision in their contracts or are thinking of doing so, as well as their legal counsel.

Safety First

Downed Power Line



During a recent storm we had in Northern California with high winds and rain, a huge tree was ripped up from its roots and landed across the road near my house. When it came down, it took down several power lines. So, I thought it would be a good reminder for us all what to do with downed power lines.

What to do if you see a downed power line. Never, ever touch a downed power line or go near one. Power lines are not insulated

like power cords. Always assume the power line is live.

- Don't touch a fallen power line or anything touching the wire.
- Do not touch anything or anyone in contact with a fallen power line or other equipment.
- · Keep children and pets away from fallen electric wires

- · Do not drive over a fallen power line.
- · Call 911 immediately to report a fallen power line.

During a recent storm we had in Northern California with high winds and rain, a huge tree was ripped up from its roots and landed across the road near my house. When it came down, it took down several power lines. So, I thought it would be a good reminder for us all what to do with downed power lines.

What to do if a power line touches your car.If your vehicle comes in contact with a downed power line.

- Stay inside! The safest place is in your car. The ground around your car may be energized.
- · Honk the horn, roll down your window and yell for help.
- Warn others to stay away. Anyone who touches the equipment or ground around the vehicle may be injured.
- Use your mobile phone to call 911.
- Fire department, police and PG&E workers will tell you when it is safe to get out of the vehicle.

If there is a fire and you have to exit a vehicle that has come in contact with downed power lines.

- · Remove loose items of clothing.
- Keep your hands at your sides and jump clear of the vehicle, so you are not touching the car when your feet hit the ground.
- · Keep both feet close together and shuffle away from the vehicle without picking up your feet.
